#### Introduction

Have you ever felt like studying Scripture is a duty—just another thing to check off your list? Perhaps you know it's something you "should do" everyday, but you don't really know why. Why *is* studying Scripture so important? The answer may surprise you. It isn't about meeting a certain standard or expectation that God has set—it is about deepening your relationship with Him.

God has created each of us with a desire to be known and loved for who we are, and, believe it or not, God wants the same thing. He longs for us to know Him as He is. For if we know Him—I mean, really know Him—we can't help but love Him.

Developing your relationship with God is similar to developing an earthly friendship—it takes effort. The more time you spend with God, getting to know Him through His Word, the deeper your relationship will become. Do you desire to know God as He really is? Let's get started!

# Studying Scripture (Part 2)

Have you ever read a passage of Scripture and wondered what you were supposed to be getting out of it? You know there's something there to find—or else God wouldn't have included it in the Bible—but you have no idea what it is. It's kind of like being on a treasure hunt without knowing what the "treasure" is that you are looking for.

So, the question is no longer *why* should we study Scripture, but *how* should we study it. What is the treasure that we are to seek? Is it truths that we can apply to our lives? Principles we should follow? People we should imitate? Though all of these are good things, they aren't ultimately what—or, in this case, whom—we should seek. We want to search for the treasure of all treasures—God Himself. The Bible is, after all, His story, so why wouldn't we be looking for Him?

That means that when we read, we must read with God in mind. It's something like looking at a picture that contains hidden objects. No matter how cluttered the picture may seem, if you focus your attention on finding the hidden objects, they eventually will come into view. The same is true with looking for God in the Bible. God's character and ways are tucked away in every passage of Scripture, just waiting to be found. Are you ready for more from your Bible study? How you study Scripture makes all the difference.

## Wrapping It Up

#### What we've learned


- 1. Our goal shouldn't be studying the Bible, as much as studying God in the Bible.
- 2. We can uncover truths about God by observing His actions and words, as well as the actions and words of others.

### This Month's Assignment

Last month you explored some of God's distinct attributes. Now that you know a little bit more about Him, this month's assignment should be much easier.

From this point on, you will have one devotional passage to read each day, five per week. The other two days can be used for personal review. Some passages address multiple themes and may be repeated on different weeks. You will use the same format for the rest of this study, so it is important that you understand how it works from the start.

The format is broken down into three main sections. In the first section you will gather information about God, in the second you will glean important truths from the information you found in Section 1, and in the third section you will



identify a verse or passage that sticks out to you, which will be helpful later when we study meditation and memorization. Now, let's further break down each section.

#### The First Section

The first section contains the following three questions:

- 1. What does God do in the passage?
- 2. What does God say in the passage?
- 3. What do others say about God, and how do they respond to Him?

Though these questions differ only slightly, each one will provide critical information about God's character and ways. For this section, read through the text a couple of times, looking for key actions and words that would answer the questions. Then jot down the answers in their proper categories. At this point, don't worry about quoting verses word for word—explain them in your own words. Be sure to include the reference for the verse in which your answer was found so that you will know where your answers came from.

Let's look at an example. Read Mark 4:35–41 in your own Bible right now. Then look at the answers provided.

#### What does God do in this passage?

- Left the crowd and got into a boat (v. 36)
- Fell asleep (v. 38)
- · Was awakened by His disciples (v. 38)
- · Got up and rebuked the wind and the waves (v. 39)

#### What does God say in this passage?

- Suggested that they leave the crowd and go over to the other side of the sea (v. 35)
- Rebuked the wind and waves, saying, "Quiet! Be still!" (v. 39)
- Asked the disciples why they were afraid (v. 40)

#### What do others say about God, and how do they respond to Him?

- The wind and the waves obeyed Him (v. 39)
- The disciples said to each other, "Who is this man? Even the wind and the waves obey this command!" (v. 41)

#### Q: When a question refers to "God," which member of the Godhead does it mean?

A: "God" can refer to any member of the Trinity—Father, Son, or Holy Spirit.

#### Q: What if a passage doesn't have an answer in all three sections?

A: When you run into this situation, just cross out the section that you don't use. Don't be alarmed—this will happen. In fact, it is rare to find passages that have answers in all three categories.

## Q: Are the actions described in the first question God's obvious actions or His behind-the-scenes actions?

A: They can be both or either. You will likely see God's obvious actions in a passage first but may recognize His behind-the-scenes after some further thinking.

#### Q: Do all of my answers have to be in the right order?

A: No. While it is nice to have things in their right order, you may see details that you missed initially that you want to include later. In this case, just add them to the end of the list in the appropriate category.

#### Q: What if an answer seems to fit into more than one category?

A: Pick the category you think the answer fits best. There is no right or wrong way to answer the questions, and many things will be up to your discretion. However, what you've found is important information, so it needs to be included somewhere.

#### The Second Section

The second section contains the following two questions:

- 1. What does God reveal about Himself through this passage?
- 2. How does what I've learned about God impact my life today?

In order to answer the first question in this section, you will need to review the answers to the questions from Section 1. Consider what can be learned about God's character (e.g., all-powerful, faithful, loving) and ways (e.g., God's timing is perfect, God is in complete control, God hears and answers our prayers) from the words and actions you've recorded. This list doesn't need to be in any particular order, nor do you need to include biblical references.

The second question in this section is an application question, connecting what you have learned about God to whatever you are currently facing in life. For instance, if the passage you've studied reveals that nothing is difficult for God, then you might apply it by trusting that whatever seemingly impossible situation you are facing is not impossible with Him. There is no right answer to the question. In fact, others may have been impacted by something different than you were. That is because God is working through His Holy Spirit to teach you something uniquely personal.

Let's take a look at what the answers for our sample passage might look like. Keep in mind that these answers are subjective, which means that your answers might be slightly different than the example.

What does God reveal about Himself through this passage?

- He is all-powerful.
- Even the wind and the waves obey His command.
- · His words are powerful.
- · There is nothing to fear when Jesus is with Me.
- God is worthy of my trust.

How does what I've learned about God impact my life today?

God has the ability to calm the storm I am facing. I need to trust thim and not fear.

#### The Third Section

The third section contains a space for you to write down a verse that stuck out to you as you studied the passage. In Lesson 3, this will become the verse you meditate upon, and in Lesson 6, you will memorize the verse you've selected. Again, there is no wrong or right verse to choose. Just pick one that has special meaning to you. Unlike the answers in the other sections, this time you will write the verse down word for word.

Take a look at the sample below.

#### Special verse:

Mark 4:39 - And he arose, and rebuked the wind, and said unto the sea, Peace, be still. And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm.
